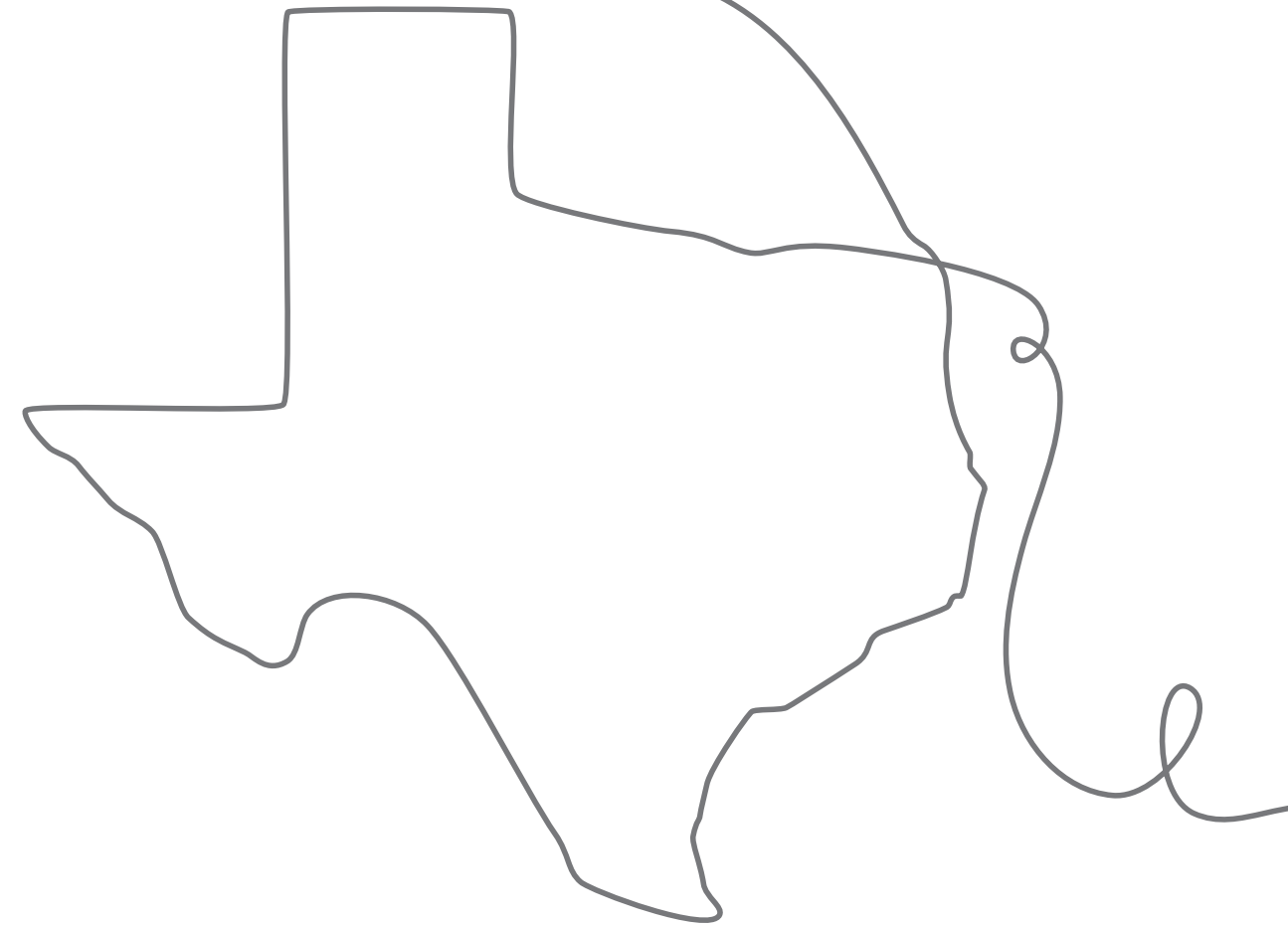

Animal	Things that Animals Really Do	Things that Animals Really Can't Do (Personification)

TITLE The Crowded Noisy House	
CHARACTERS poor man, wife, 5 children, mother-in-law, rabbi	SETTING poor man’s house
PLOT	1 The poor man’s house is crowded and noisy, so he seeks advice from his rabbi. Rabbi repeatedly tells him to have another animal live in his house.
	2 The poor man follows the rabbi’s advice, but noise and crowding only gets worse each time.
	3 The rabbi tells the poor man to remove the animals. Now the house is so much less crowded and noisy!
LESSON Don’t get upset when things are going badly, because it could always be worse.	

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
