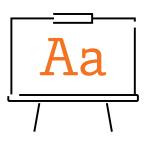

Lessons begin to combine skills and knowledge with increasingly complex texts, close reading, and a greater writing emphasis. Students start to use their skills to go on their own independent reading adventures. In Grades 3-5, foundational skills and knowledge building lessons are integrated into one set of Amplify Caminos materials.

Amplify Caminos is built on the science of how kids learn to read.

Every day in Grades K-2, students complete one full lesson that builds foundational reading skills in the Amplify Caminos Lectoescritura strand, as well as one full lesson that builds background knowledge in the Amplify Caminos Conocimiento strand. In Grades 3–5, students start to master the basic skills of reading, further opening up their worlds.

Strong skills foundation

You know great reading instruction starts with helping kids develop great reading skills. Built on the Science of Reading, Amplify Caminos Lectoescritura features an explicit, systematic approach that leverages entirely authentic instruction, built from the ground up for the Spanish language. By building a solid foundation of phonological awareness and phonics, students will learn the sounds of vowels and common consonants first, and blend them to form syllables. Syllables will also be blended to form words. Less frequent consonants and other complex elements of the Spanish language will be presented at a later stage of the program.

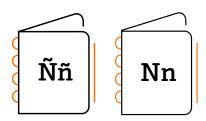
Deep content knowledge

Engaging and authentic Spanish texts

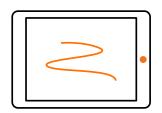
Diverse texts provide both windows and mirrors, helping students better understand themselves and the world around them.

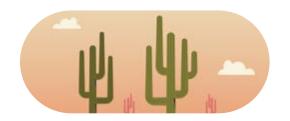

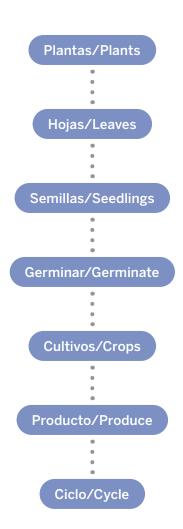

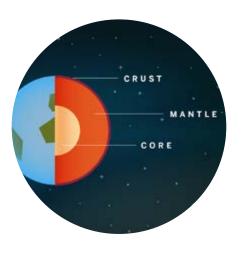

We believe we have a responsibility to provide literacy instruction that gives every student an equal opportunity to succeed and even excel. Authentic literature

Caminos includes both transadaptations and authentic texts written by Latin American and Spanish authors. Authentic literature exposes students to a variety of text types and perspectives to deepen their knowledge of fascinating topics in social studies, science, literature, and the arts. Authentic texts support text-to-self, text-to-world, and text-to-text connections for readers.





Amplify Caminos is built on the conviction that equitable instruction is vital to an effective program. Decodable Student Readers celebrate students' diverse experiences and feature individuals with a broad range of identity factors, including socio-economic status, age, ability, race, ethnicity, country of origin, and more.

Skills

Every day in the Amplify Caminos classroom, students practice their existing reading skills while stretching themselves toward new goals. This program has a completely authentic Spanish skills strand, Amplify Caminos Lectoescritura, built from the ground up for the Spanish language. In K–2, each day includes dedicated skills time to give students a solid foundation. In the upper grades, skills instruction becomes integrated with knowledge lessons, and students engage with increasingly complex content-rich texts and writing activities.

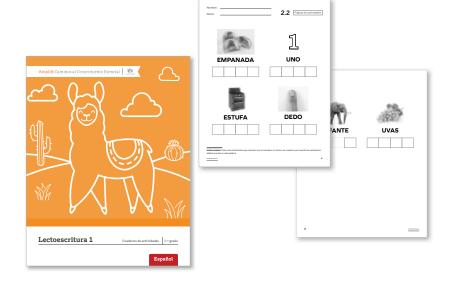

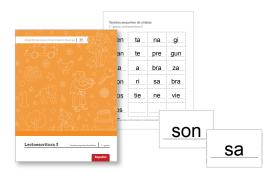
Lectoescritura Teacher Guides

Diverse, engaging, and authentically Spanish decodable chapter books are the basis for the instruction of foundational skills.



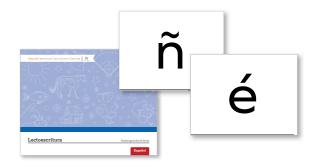
Large Syllable Cards

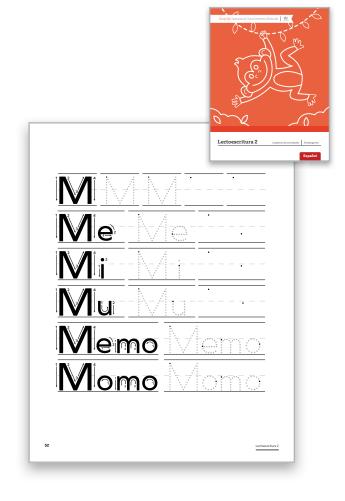

Building a foundation, in Spanish and English

The skills instruction in Amplify Caminos was distinctly developed with the Spanish language in mind. Its foundational lessons are specific to the language, rather than a direct translation from Amplify CKLA's English skills instruction.

Reading instruction will begin with the vowels first, then the most common consonants, and finally the least common consonants. Students will be blending and segmenting sounds to form syllables, and syllables to form words.

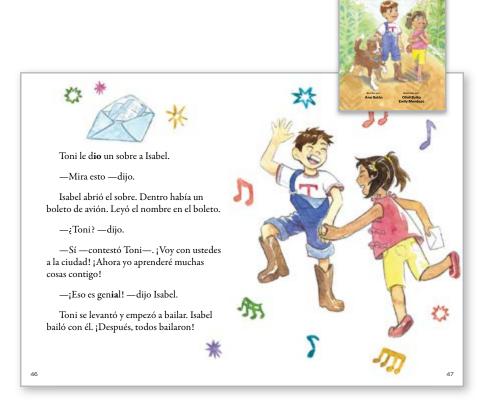
Although Spanish has a highly predictable orthography, there are a few silent letters (h is always silent, u is silent after g or q), as well as letters that can make different sounds, depending on the letters that follow them. For that reason, syllables with these letters are taught somewhat later in the progression. The same is true for syllables with infrequently occurring consonants, such as *z. k. x.* and *w.*







For example, the Amplify Caminos approach to phonological and phonemic awareness is uniquely designed for the Spanish language. Students will first learn the five vowel sounds. Next, they will learn to combine the vowels with consonants to form open syllables (e.g., ma, me, mi, mo, mu). Open syllables represent the most frequently occurring syllable pattern in Spanish.



As children become adept at reading words made up of simple open syllables, they can begin examining words that include closed syllables (e.g., al-to and pan), as well as words with consonant blends (e.g., clase, grande, etc.), diphthongs (e.g., baile, auto, etc.), and hiatuses (e.g. río, día).

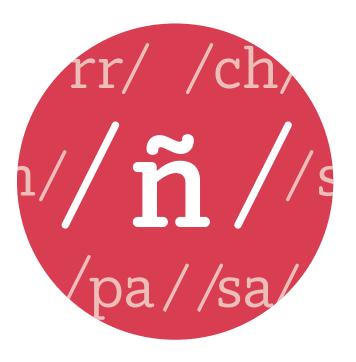

The Science of Reading: Skills



Start with the sound

All instruction starts with phonological awareness, which research shows benefits the greatest number of students. Students begin by learning to recognize sounds, as well as to articulate them.



Build to the phoneme and syllable

Students build their awareness of phonemes to quickly form syllables. We give teachers a variety of tools, including multisensory gestures, to help early learners develop this awareness.



Crack the code

Once students can recognize sounds, they learn to form syllables. Amplify Caminos Lectoescritura starts by teaching the sound-spellings of the vowels and the most frequent consonants in Spanish so your students learn to form the corresponding letter codes. This lets your students read and write as many words as possible, as soon as possible.



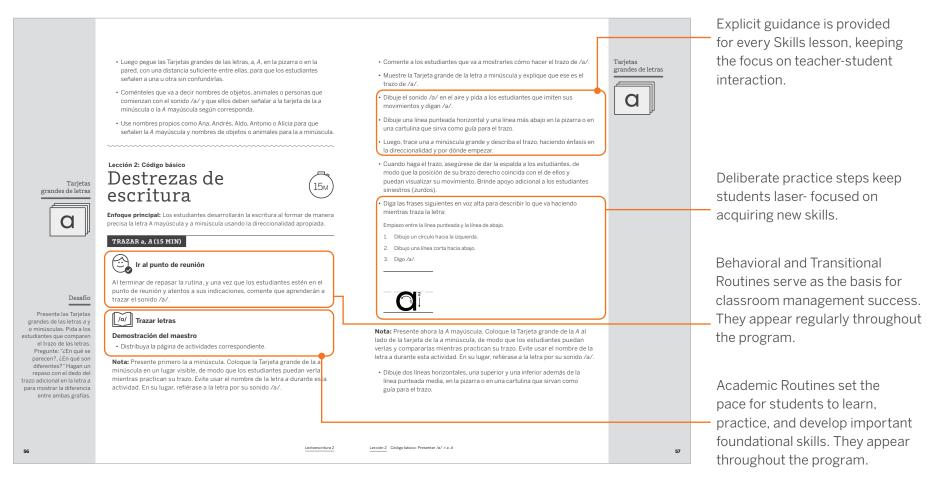
Grow in complexity

The lessons continue to challenge students as they progress, introducing complications like multisyllabic words, digraphs, accents, diphthongs, and hiatus. In each case, students encounter complications as they become ready for them.



Start with the sound

Skills instruction always starts by introducing the sound first. (Research shows that's what works best for students, especially in bilingual settings.)
